



The Gospel of Reconciliation and Christ's Way of Peace

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Anabaptist churches have held to pacifism and active peacemaking in repeated statements, including the 1993 statement, [A Commitment to Christ's Way of Peace](#) ^[1].

Many Anabaptist organizations have worked at peacemaking. Mennonites in particular have contributed to building peace in South Africa during the "struggle years" and now in the new South Africa.
